Spring Hospital Exhibition - we handed out on 7th July and many thanks go to all who helped, as ever. 16 paintings were sold. We had some problems at handing-in, mainly due to some members presenting work that was 'unhangable' without remedial work by those of us trying to design boards etc. This resulted in a backlog of work reaching the hangers who, understandably, became somewhat grumpy simply kicking their heels waiting for paintings to hang. PLEASE read the instructions on how to present your work with the correct mirror plates (affixed in the correct place on the frame!) **Note 1:** It is <u>impossible</u> to fix mirror plates to plastic frames. Note 2: Ensure there are NO projections on the back of the frame which prevent the painting sitting flush against the wall. Tricia, our esteemed Secretary 2nd string, has had a brainwave about our handing-out process for these exhibitions - please see her piece at the end of my waffle. What took her so long to think of it. we ask?

Important 'heads up' (again) for the Autumn/ Winter Hospital Exhibition - unusually this year we hand in on Saturday 6th October, two days **before** the Annual Exhibition hands out on Monday the 8th. The Club has no control over these dates, they are given to us and we have to fit our programme around them. This means of course that we can't simply take unsold work from one exhibition and hand it in to the next. So, it's either get the 'old stuff' out of the attic or paint new stuff!

Douglas Skeggs Lecture

Following the Private View on Friday 14th September 2018 will be a lecture by Douglas Skeggs on 'Krakow: The City of the Dragon'

Douglas Skeggs is an internationally renowned art lecturer. He read Fine Art at Magdalene College Cambridge and has been a lecturer on paintings since 1980. In that time he has given over 4000 lectures to universities, colleges and art societies. He has lectured in Belgium, France, Germany and Spain, and has taken numerous tours around Europe. He has written and presented various TV documentaries, notably Omnibus.

The lecture is from 7:30 to 8:30 in the Discovery Centre Performance Hall, and is open to members and non-members. Tickets are £8 (£6 for concessions) and available in advance from the Art Club, Discovery Centre Box Office, and Newbury Building Society, 143 High St, Winchester; and on the day at the Preview Evening.

Treasurer

At the beginning of June the Club's bank balance stood at £5,114, which was £103 lower than the same time last year, which is not of concern. Courses in 2018 ran at a deficit of £302, compared with a deficit of £383 last year. The reduction in deficit was partly due to an increase in course fees from £20 to £25, and one course being cancelled due to insufficient registrations. There are still some of last year's members who have not yet renewed and a number of members whose standing orders were paid at the old rate of £12, and if all payments are received this will amount to a further £153 in the Club's account.

And last but not least, we have commissioned a specialist company to erect a number of bespoke direction signs to the exhibition on routes into Winchester. We hope this will be an improvement on the home-made signs of previous years and of course there will be no excuse now for getting lost.

A Message from Derek

I wish to express my gratitude to Club members for the £490 cash present that they gave me on my retirement from the Committee. When considering how to spend the money I felt that it would be appropriate if I chose some art-related activities. The conclusion that I came to was to build a trip to London with my wife Kate that revolved around the National Gallery "Monet & Architecture" exhibition. We booked three nights in the Amba Charing Cross Hotel starting on Friday 27th April where we arrived late afternoon, having already booked tickets for a concert that evening in St Martins in the Fields church.

With a few hours to spare we walked the short distance to the National Gallery and took in some old favourites like the Impressionists and Stubb's 'Whistle Jacket' and then went back to the hotel for dinner. This gave us plenty of time for the even shorter walk to St Martins where we listened to the ten-strong chamber group, London Concertante, playing through an excellent programme that included two movements of Vivaldi's Four Seasons, Pachelbel's Canon and Monti's Hungarian Czardas.

The next Morning we went to a National Trust Property in Hampstead called Fenton House. This is a 17th/18th century house with an excellent china and porcelain figurine collection and a good walled garden. This was mostly for my flower arranging wife. I think that she enjoyed the garden even though it was raining and bitterly cold. In the afternoon we avoided the cold by visiting the superb Wallace Collection. We completed that day by a visit to Westminster Cathedral followed by dinner with my daughter and son-in-law in a favourite family-run restaurant near Victoria Station that they use often.

On Sunday morning we had tickets for a 10am slot at the National Gallery, Sainsbury Wing. Here we lingered feasting on 77 of Monet's pictures. They were nicely hung in a way which picked up his various themes in a roughly chronological order. The price included a small explanatory handbook and the limited number of people admitted meant that viewing was comfortable.

In the afternoon we took a bus east to the Guildhall Art Gallery. This is the modern successor to an earlier gallery that was bombed during WWII. It is spacious and well-lit and we had the place almost to ourselves. There is no entry charge and the main part of the gallery specialises in Victorian art with Millet and Rossetti well represented. The building also includes, in the basement, the preserved remains of part of the Roman Amphitheatre which was discovered during the building of the Gallery. It is nicely lit and well presented. That evening we had a quiet meal in a local Italian restaurant and then turned in early.

On Monday it was raining and very cold so we checked out of the hotel, then dived down the tube to Waterloo and came home to a warm house. In spite of the weather we had spent a memorable weekend and done everything that we planned to do.
